WHAT IS JASC?

The Japan-America Student Conference (JASC) is a student-led program, initiated in 1934 by university students concerned by the breakdown of bilateral relations prior to the Second World War. Today, an equal number of students from the U.S. and Japan are competitively selected each year to spend one summer month together, studying and analyzing Japan-U.S. relations while visiting four diverse regions in the host country. JASC alternates its host country every year, emphasizing the personal connections between two distinct cultures gathered together in one place.

Roundtables (RTs): The students of JASC will often break up into designated roundtables consisting of five Japanese delegates and five American delegates. These roundtables provide an open and safe environment in which students can exchange knowledge and personal experience related to hot-button global issues of interest to both Japan and the United States.

Field Trips: As the JASC delegation visits different sites in the host country, the delegates will be able to participate in various field trips to places of interest within the site. These include general field trips for the entire delegation as well as separate field trips for different roundtables based on the roundtable's topic.

Special Topics: JASC delegates will occasionally participate in discussions in groups different from their roundtable groups to promote open conversation about important and sometimes controversial topics that do not fall under roundtable categories.

Reflection: At the end of each site, JASC delegates take part in a group reflection in which each delegate is given time to speak to the group about anything he or she wants, whether it is suggestions for improvement, a word of thanks, or a concern.
